Every year participants from the member universities can meet at our Annual Conference organized by the colleagues from the university in one of that year's ECoc.

This year the University of Galway was to accommodate the Annual Conference, but unfortunately that dreadful pandemic COVID-19 threw a spanner in the works. Both the Irish colleagues' enthousiasm to organize the conference and our hopes for an annually renewed interchange of ideas on revised scientific approaches to the study of ECoC and its societal implications were shattered. But thanks to the resilience, creativity and dynamism of Catherine Morris and Patrick Lonergan, 2020 will not pass by without a UNEECC event. Many thanks to both of them.

This online issue namely is the positive answer of our Irish colleagues to the pandemic that prevented us from meeting in Galway this year for our Annual Conference. Notwithstanding the difficult situation of most colleagues' academic assignments, they succeeded in collecting contributions from different countries. And of course, we are grateful I for the intellectual contributions of these colleagues as well.
